# Sees a three-phase division in coming Vatican Council

CHICAGO—'The Second Vatican Council probably will be split into three sessions, extending over a period of nearly a year, it was predicted here by Father Gustave Weigel, S.J., a noted theologian and author who is helping to prepare for it.

Father Weigel, a professor at the Woodstock (Md.) College and a leading expert on Protestant-Catholic relations, made this observation

First session-October 11 to De-

Second session — February 2, 1963 to shortly before Holy Week. Easter falls on April 14 next year.

Third session - Pentecost (50 days after Easter), or June 2, 1963, to sometime in July, 1963.

FINE, in his book "Tra Modern Guide to Education," calls non-inguise elementary and secondary schools "most important and growing more so each year" in American education. The author of 13 other books on education, he is now education editor for the North American Newspaper Willance.

The current Catholic school enrollment, he notes, represents an increase of 6.2 times the total for 1900. Public school enrollment, in the same period, has increased 2.3 times.

#### Comment

The opinions expressed in these editorial columns represent a Catholic viewpoint—not necessarily THE Catholic viewpoint. They are efforts of the editors to serve public opinion within the Church and within the Nation.

To think of the conditon of affairs throughout the world this Good Friday can bring on a mood of pessimism. Every-where we look, there is trouble, and deep trouble.

Germany, after nearly twenty years of "peace," is still split in two with a wall through the heart of Berlin. Spain, after nearly thirty years, is still almost ostracized politically in Europe. Portugal is riddled with unaccustomed tensions at home and abroad. Poland, Hungary, Czecho-slovakia, Rumania, and all Eastern European countries are under a communist domination that is maintained by force.

force.

The Holy Land of Palestine is a mess of barbed-wire entanglements. There are, and have been for fifteen years, more than a million destitute Arab retugees in Jordan. A new peace treaty is being soaked in blood in Algeria, where representatives of a great civilization are proving themselves to have less patience, less fortiude in adversity, less Christianity than Algerian Muslims. In every one of the newly emerging states in central Africa, there is disruption and misery of some sort, and, in some, a hundred years of missionary, medical and educational effort is in danger of being thrown away. In South Africa, white men are busily proving themselves the superior of "the natives" in nothing so much as bigotry and prejudice.

In China, the people are in the grip of a social catastrophe. Nothing but tales of ambushes and rumors of wars comes out of South East Asia. In South America—but why go on? There seems to be much less peace in the world on this Good Friday than on the first Good Friday.

In addition, the cancer of communism, of atheistic materialism, is eating away at the social organization of all mankind. And, over all, there is the shadow of The Bomb.

But, as Good Friday is not long before Easter Sunday, our pessimism need not be too far from our optimism. If we feel less at peace than in previous times, we probably understand the need of it more acutely now than ever before and are likely to work harder to secure it. From the great development of the techniques of communication, each nation is becoming more conscious of the others and, in the long run, more likely to know how to live with them.

Espacially in the last two decades, and very espacially since the amountement of the Ecumenical Council, there is a surface the control of the Ecumenical Council, there is a surface the control of completion, has already brought about a wonderful spirit of mutual tolerance, understanding and general good will. We may remind ourselves optimistically that—to reverse the Gospel quotation—the wheat is growing up with the tares.

It is certain that mankind will yet have many severe trials and suffering before peace on earth can be achieved, but it is reasonable to hope there are enough men of good will right now to turn us away from the untimate foolishness, a totally destructive nuclear war.

However, come what may, we may meditate on the events of the first Good Friday and remember that no disaster is ever final. For each individual man, woman and child there is the promtse of the Resurrection and an eternity of happiness in the life to come.

## Public money

In recent times, almost every one of the letters we receive about "federal" or "welfare statist" or "socialist" attitudes to public spending is more or less vituperative; applying epithets to personalities rather than analyzing ideas and issues. The first letter in our "Opinions" column this week is therefore a welcome relief, and it is a pleasure to make what comments we may on the points the lady rations.

She asks whether we are in favor of increasing "the present \$500 billion National Debt." Our reply is that, in common with everyone else, we are not in favor of increasing the National Debt at any level, if that is at all possible to avoid.

In saying so, we ought to point out that the present figure, \$295.3 billion, is by no means due to government spending on so-called "welfare" or "socialist" programs. World War II cost this country \$288.8 billion. It is not surprising, therefore, that the National Debt went up from \$87.1 billion in 1938 to \$289.4 billion in 1946. Since 1946, National Defense spending—including Veterans programs, a legitimate hangover from World War II—has been 68.3 per cent of the total U.S. spending for all purposes, whether domestic or foreign. It is not surprising, therefore, that the National Debt has not decreased. In fact, some may think it a matter for congratulation it has not increased more than it has.

While we are in the situation that requires nearly 70 cents of our tax dollar annually for military purposes, the notion that economies in other programs will radically reduce the National Debt is a defusion.

While Congress finds it necessary to approve, and some-times add to, government proposals for military spending, it is illogical to challenge much smaller social projects on the basis that they add materially to the National Debt. The Nike-Zeus (defensive missile) program, for example, is expected to cost some SI4 billion in the next couple of years. Medical Care for the Aged would represent about one-twentieth of that sum, and moreover, would not affect the National Debt at all if integrated, as proposed by the present Administration, in the existing Social Security pro-gram.

It is also illogical to challenge Medical Care for the Aged and similar social projects on the basis that they are "undermining the free enterprise system." The free enterprise system has already been much more extensively undermined (if the word "undermined" is insisted upon) by government spending on National Defense (852.6 billion) in this year's budget), Space Research (82.4 billion), and Agriculture (83.8 billion), all of which is no more or no less than a massive government subsidy of our national economy. It is ax-money going directly to U.S. business enterprises and also to underpin the prices of farm produce.

In passing, we may observe that "grosspraying" thought

In passing, we may observe that "conservative" thought has not been noticeably critical of the excess stock-pling of war materials to the tune of some \$\$0\$ billion, or the surplus farm produce on which the storage alone costs the tax-payer \$1.5 million a day; not, at any rate, on the grounds that it is the "creeping socialism of federal subsidies."

However much we may be inclined to deplore it, we must all face the fact that our modern society has become so very complex that some form of central planning is unavoidable in many areas. We must recognize the unfortunate history of international relationships in this century, (Continued on page 9)

Tradition says that of the nails, one is preserved in the Basilica of the Holy Cross in Rome. One was used in the diadem of Constantine, long known as the Iron Crown of Lombardy, now preserved in the Cathedral of Mouza, Italy.

A third is venerated in the Cathedral of Milan. Christian tradition and archaeology little the number of nails to four. There is a legend to the effect that one of the nails was, by royal decree, divided and reworked into tweel nails, each of which is venerated in various. European churches today, This would account for the number of nails claimed as relies in so many churches.

THE INSCRIPTION board was consigned by St. Helena to the Basiliae of the Holy Cross in Rome, where it has remained ever since. The pillar believed to be the one of the sourging was brought to Rome from Jerusalem in 1223 by Cardinal Colona, Papal Legate to the Sixth Crusade. It is kept in the Church of St. Prazedes in Rome.

# Says patient can forego medical aid

LAS VEGAS, Nov. — A moral theologian said here that in certain cases a patient suffering a serious illness is not obliged to a clack extraordinary means to preserve his life.

The statement was made by Father Gerald Kelly, S.J., director of St. Louis University's control of the control of t

"MAN IS obliged to take rea-sonable means to preserve life and health," the Jesuit theologian said, "but he is not strictly obliged to take any means which, in concrete circumstances, in-volve excessive hardship for him-self or others."

Such hardship, he explained, could include excessive expense,

could include excessive expense, pain or risk.
Referring to the constant sufferer whose life can be prolonged by antibiotics, blood transfusions, intravenous feedings and by more recent medical discoveries, Fater Kelly stated: "While prolonging his life, these artificial means are also prolonging his agony.
