

The prayer furor

On June 25, 1962, the United States Supreme Court touched off a thunderclap of controversy that reverberates to this day. It handed down a 6-to-1 decision for bidding the recital of a 22-word public school prayer to a non-denominational God.

The prayer had been drafted by the New York State Board of Regents and recommended for recitation in state public schools.

This was followed in 1963 by Supreme Court decisions banning recitation of the Lord's Prayer and Bible reading exercises in public schools.

That same year a former New York congressman, Frank J. Becker, sought unsuccessfully to amend the Constitution of the United States to restore prayers in unison and Bible exercises to public schools.

Now the issue is back in the limelight with Senate subcommittee hearings on Senator Everett Dirksen's proposal to alter the First Amendment to the Constitution "to provide for and permit" the "voluntary participation" in public school prayers.

We hope and trust Senator Dirksen's proposal will get no further than that of Congressman Becker.

It long has been quite clear that the Supreme Court ruled out neither prayer nor Bible study, but merely the imposition of any one formula of prayer or Bible study—a formula that might favor one religious body at the expense of another.

Indeed, in its decisions the high tribunal, composed of religious men, went out of its way to stress that its attitude was one of neutrality, not antagonism, toward religion. Justice Tom Clark stated that "nothing we have said here indicates that... study of the Bible, or of religion, when presented objectively as part of a secular program of education, may not be effected consistent with the First Amendment."

Curiously and disappointingly, however, those who have persisted in making such a fuss about the court's decisions have done precious little to promote academic study of religion and the Bible in the public schools.

In September, 1964, United Press International made a comprehensive nation-wide survey of the mater. It reported that "a majority of school authorities polled displayed a lack of enthusiasm for the whole idea" of such studies and that few courses had been introduced since the Supreme Court rulings.

There is nothing to indicate that this situation has changed for the better in the past two years. This is truly a pity. How can a high-school student get a well-rounded education without exposure to the history of religion, which is so much a part of the whole history of humanity? of humanity?

This was one of the major points made last week by Tather Robert F. Drinan, S.J., dean of the Boston College Law School, who led off opposition testimony before the Senate subcommittee holding hearings on the "Dirksen amendment."

"This state of affairs," they point out, "needs correction; we must come to know the techniques so well that we are aware of its merits and can bring pressure to correct its defects."


