But I must come clean. This is also a very stressful time of year. I find myself fighting the

end of the year work deadlines, budgeting "creatively" to make sure Christmas presents can be bought and wishing there was more time in the day to get everything done.

And then there are the telephone calls.

I am speaking of the calls we receive at Catholic Charities that seem to come more frequently this time of year. Those seeking assistance sound a bit more distressed, fearful and uncertain as they seek food or shelter from the cold, a Christmas present for their child, or financial assistance to keep their heat on. I want to throw up my hands and say "God, the need is too great, what more can we possibly do!"

And then I hear: "I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me" (Mt 25:35).

I am reminded that God is not asking me, or you, to solve the world's problems alone; he is simply asking each of us to love the person that is next to us.

A priest friend of mine recently shared a story about a person who asked St. Teresa of Calcutta the secret to holiness. She simply said "perseverance." I wasn't expecting that answer. I will admit that I was expecting a more profound statement, something wiser sounding, perhaps empowering. Not perseverance. Perseverance sounded to me...well, unexciting. But then I began to think about the meaning of perseverance which is the persistence in doing something despite difficulty or delay in achieving success. When God asks each of us to love our neighbor, he doesn't say it will be easy, but he does ask us to persevere in our love for one another.

It seems only fitting that this month, the month of Thanksgiving, **Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese** of Indianapolis is celebrating its 100th Anniversary. That is 100 years of walking with men, women, and children, the elderly, the homeless, the newborn, the pregnant mother, the hungry, the refugee and the immigrant. It is 100 years of volunteers and staff who answered the door each time and listened, encouraged, assisted, offered a smile of hope and in that moment said, "You are not alone." What great examples of perseverance!

On November 20th, Catholic Charities will celebrate their 100th Anniversary with Mass at 5:30 p.m. at SS. Peter and Paul Cathedral. Archbishop Thompson will be our main celebrant. I can think of no better way to celebrate and offer thanks to our Catholic Charities staff and volunteers, to those who have given financially, and to those who trusted us enough to invite us to walk with them during their difficult times. More importantly, it is a beautiful way to give thanks to God for his gift of the virtue of fortitude, which can lead to perseverance. Please join us on November 20th at 5:30 p.m. We would love to see you.

I want to leave you with some related thoughts from Pope Benedict XVI's encyclical, *God is Love (Deus caritas est)*. I see this quote more as a prayer for each of us to take to heart in those moments when we grow weary:

"Seeing with the eyes of Christ, I can give to others much more than their outward necessities; I can give them the look of love which they crave. Only my readiness to encounter my neighbor and to show him love makes me sensitive to God as well. Only if I serve my neighbor can my eyes be opened to what God does for me and how much he loves me. No longer is it a question, then, of a "commandment" imposed from without and calling for the impossible, but rather of a freely-bestowed experience of love from within, a love which by its very nature must then be shared with others. Love grows through love. Love is "divine" because it comes from God and unites us to God; through this unifying process it makes us a "we" which transcends our divisions and makes us one, until in the end God is "all in all" (1 Cor 15:28).

I pray that during this Thanksgiving season each of us experiences the love of Christ as we see him in one another.





CCHD - Multimedia Youth Contest Creating on the Margins

Teacher, Educators, Youth Ministers, Campus Ministers, and Young Artists <u>Please Read</u>



The Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD) Creating on the Margins Contest is a tool to engage young people in grades 7-12 in learning about poverty in the U.S., its root causes, and faith-inspired efforts to address poverty, especially through CCHD.

The theme of this year's contest is *"More Than a Roof"* and reflects upon how the crisis of unaffordable housing and homelessness affects both families and individuals in our communities. "A house is much more than a roof over one's head. It is a place where a person creates and lives out his or her life." – St. John Paul II

The contest is designed to be used *across disciplines*. Contestant art entries can be of any form—for example, video, short story, painting, song, photography, etc. The contest requires that students respond to four reflective essay questions. Youth in

grades 7-12 are eligible to participate.

Schools and parishes submit **art entries**, **reflection essays**, and **permission forms** to the Archdiocese no later than **February 26**, **2020**. The voting committee will select winners for each grade category (grades 7-9 and grades 10-12). Local winners will be honored at a Catholic Charities event and featured in The Criterion. The diocesan winning entries will be sent to the CCHD national office for judging in the national contest. The national CCHD office will then select a national grand prize winner and other winners. The national grand prize winner will be awarded his/her prize on the main stage of a national Catholic conference.

Highlights of Your Great Work St. Vincent de Paul Parish Bedford, IN

Spaghetti on the Square

A little over 4 years ago, Pastor Rick Eldred and several volunteers from St. Vincent de Paul Parish in Bedford, IN saw a real need to help house and feed the growing number of homeless men in the community. It really hit home after one particularly cold day a man was found frozen to death after not being able to find shelter in the night.

Through persistence and perseverance, the Bedford Men's Warming Center opened its door in 2015. What started as a center that was only open a little over 3 months out of the year and staffed by St. Vincent de Paul parish volunteers, grew into an interfaith community effort that is now open from November to April. Over six faith community share in the preparation of daily hot meals and ministering to the men who visit the shelter.

On September 28th, the first (and to be annual) **Spaghetti on the Square** Fundraiser took place. The idea was to have multiple churches holding a spaghetti



dinner on the same night with proceeds going to the Warming Center. The goal was to raise \$2000 to \$3000.

As the idea began to spread throughout the community, it evolved from having it at separate locations to having it at one location, the Bedford Town Square. As Jennifer Richason, one of the key organizers of the event, stated, "Our volunteers started prayer and the doors started flying open."

Within in four weeks, donations started pouring in from the community that included food, drinks, live music, a snow cone machine, games and even table centerpieces. By the end of the evening, over \$12,000 was raised!

Thank you for Fr. Rick Eldred and Jennifer Richason for sharing this wonderful example of a community coming together to show the love of Christ to the Bedford community and the men who seek shelter at the Bedford Men's Warming Center.

Jennifer summed it up nicely when she said, "This was our first year. None of those who work on the event had ever lead an event so large. Though there were leaders, we lead by faith! It took our village to pull it off! We are so impressed that there are so many big hearts in our small town! I believe the Lord is pulling and pushing for change. He works through us, his people. We are his hands and we are his feet. I feel that he is very pleased with little ole Bedford."

Reflection for the Month of November

Pope Benedict God is Love (Deus caritas est)

18. Love of neighbour is thus shown to be possible in the way proclaimed by the Bible, by Jesus. It consists in the very fact that, in God and with God, I love even the person whom I do not like or even know. This can only take place on the basis of an intimate encounter with God, an encounter which has become a communion of will, even affecting my feelings. Then I learn to look on this other person not simply with my eyes and my feelings, but from the perspective of Jesus Christ. His friend is my friend. Going beyond exterior appearances, I perceive in others an interior desire for a sign of love, of concern. This I can offer them not only through the organizations intended for such purposes, accepting it perhaps as a political necessity. Seeing with the eyes of Christ, I can give to others much more than their outward necessities; I can give them the look of love which they crave. Here we see the necessary interplay between love of God and love of neighbour which the First Letter of John speaks of with such insistence. If I have no contact whatsoever with God in my life, then I cannot see in the other anything more than the other, and I am incapable of seeing in him the image of God. But if in my life I fail completely to heed others, solely out of a desire to be "devout" and to perform my "religious duties", then my relationship with God will also grow arid. It becomes merely "proper", but loveless. Only my readiness to encounter my neighbour and to show him love makes me sensitive to God as well. Only if I serve my neighbour can my eyes be opened to what God does for me and how much he loves me. The saints—consider the example of Blessed Teresa of Calcutta-constantly renewed their capacity for love of neighbour from their encounter with the Eucharistic Lord, and conversely this encounter acquired its real- ism and depth in their service to others. Love of God and love of neighbour are thus inseparable, they form a single commandment. But both live from the love of God who has loved us first. No longer is it a question, then, of a "commandment" imposed from without and calling for the impossible, but rather of a freely-bestowed experience of love from within, a love which by its very nature must then be shared with others. Love grows through love. Love is "divine" because it comes from God and unites us to God; through this unifying process it makes us a "we" which transcends our divisions and makes us one, until in the end God is "all in all" (1 Cor 15:28).
