Ahhh, Summer... a time to slow down, get outside, and enjoy this incredible season. Recently I had a fun girls day with my young daughters and several of my nieces. We went to the butterfly gardens at the Indianapolis Zoo, and then headed to Monument Circle in downtown Indianapolis to enjoy ice cream cones on the Circle. It was a great day of giggles, butterflies and ice cream!

While we were walking to the ice cream shop, all the girls noticed several people in tattered clothes who were randomly sleeping on the sidewalks and others who were sitting, begging, looking tired.

The girls were all silent as we walked, observing the people they were passing. I could tell they were really trying to process what they were seeing. Then the questions came...

"Why is that man sleeping on the sidewalk?"

"Why are his clothes ripped?"

"I can see that man's underwear through the holes in his pants."

"Do they not have a home?"

"Do you think they are hungry?"

"What is in that garbage bag; is that all her belongings?"

Though this was a great teaching opportunity for me to talk to them about mercy, love, seeing Christ in others - it was tough to help them understand the complexities of homelessness without blowing their little brain cells.

As the girls sat and ate their ice cream, giggling and being sweet girls, I could tell my nine- year-old niece was still struggling with what she witnessed in the faces of the homeless we encountered. While the others were talking, she came to me quietly and leaned in to whisper to me... "Aunt Theresa, I have some money left over from my ice cream, can I give it to the man over there?" - while indicating with her eyes who she meant. I told her that would be really nice. I watched as she approached the man, put her money in his cup, nodded to him with a smile and scurried back to me.

I realized in that simple gesture, my niece was the face of Christ to this man, as she in turn saw the face of Christ in him. I am not sure what impact my niece's gesture had on that man as she shared her money and a smile with him, but I do know by the look on my niece's face that another seed of compassion and mercy was planted in her soul.

Which leads me to this month's Social Concerns featured ministry - Share the Journey.

Last September, Pope Francis announced a two year campaign called Share the Journey. The emphasis is about overcoming our fears and encountering those around us in the migrant and refugee, and in my niece's case in the homeless, the destitute and the forgotten. It is about asking questions, listening to stories, seeing the face of Christ in all we encounter.

"Let us always meet each other with a smile, for a smile is the beginning of love." - St. Teresa of Calcutta



In September of last year, Pope Francis announced the two year <u>"Share the Journey"</u> migration campaign by encouraging people to meet with migrants and listen to their stories, rather than treat them as mere numbers.
