The Church has called on the organization to get out of politics. An ACLI leader can no longer take a responsible job in the political field!





#### Comment

#### New complexities

Next Monday, Labor Day comes round again. This year, it comes at a time when the need for our country's leadership to be acceptable and effective is more vitally important than ever to the peace of the world we live in. To strengthen our leadership in international affairs, we need to show real peace and progress at home—in labor-management relations, for example. Otherwise, our friends, our hoped-for friends and our enemies will not really be impressed with whatever our representatives might have to say, especially on political and social ideologies.

The time has come for very hard, solid thinking on the present and future state of labor-management relations. The old-style tussles between employers and employees over wages and fringe benefits may still continue, of course, but they are being complicated by new factors peculiar to our times.

Some technological advances are beginning to bear some of the characteristics of a runaway Frankenstein monster. Automation is having an increasingly favorable effect on our gross national output, but, pending a correct solution of its new problems, its effect on over-all employment will not be equally happy. It is now anticipated, for example, that automation processes will put another 2 per cent (about 330,000) of our people out of regular employment in the coming year.

There is, too, an increasing sales-pressure on outlets for our enlarging productiveness. The resultant credit-buying condition of our economy, and its public acceptance, seems to have made it necessary for women, whether married and with young families or not, to go to work as well as the men; if only to "keep up with the Joneses." Indeed, there are areas—in Pennsylvania, for example—where there is the topsy-turvy situation of women having work in factories while their men, out of employment, do the domestic chores and mind the children.

Is automation to be dealt with by retarding it? We think not. That would be just as silly as coping with the so-called population "explosion" by measures of artificial birth-control. Is it to be dealt with by "feather-bedding"? We think not. A man in a "feather-bed" job is, to all real intents and purposes, unemploved and subject to the same demoralizing influences as if he were out of a job. More so, perhaps: easy money could be an extra source of demoralization.

These factors are putting additional pressures on the contacts between management and labor. To continue to rely on force, on the medieval "trial by ordeal" method now preserved in strike procedures, is not enough. Strikes, like wars, may be inevitable, but they prove primarily that reason has broken down on one side or the other, or both. Too many strikes could be taken to show, at worst, that Karl Marx may have been right after all when he imagined the future peace and progress of mankind to depend on the result of an all-out conflict between social groups.

In fact, it may be that these and other factors present In fact, it may be that these and other factors present problems altogether insoluble within the traditional framework of collective bargaining. It may be they are elements which require some sort of "third party," some form of representation of the at present partially neglected public interest. We cannot imagine just now what institutional form this representation of the public interest may ultimately take. Perhaps an outline of this may be expressed about the Australy Council recently set up at the desire of the President. Who can say:

In the infinitely subtle and ever changing patterns of human society, it is unprofitable to speculate too much on the ultimate evolution of labor-management relations, but we all know one thing as certain, right now. The honest effort to adhere to, and apply, established, fundamental principles to unfamiliar complexities is the only safe way. A sincere, even if fumbling, search for social justice inextiably polatices better long-time and the control of the complex of the control of the control of the complex cake." The application of charity and moderation has always been reliable, and ultimately successful, in the solution of difficulties which seem immediately beyond the scope of human intelligence.

#### Progress

Motels all over the country are building public lounges, coffee-shops and other additions to their general amenities. In doing this, they are approaching more and more to the old-fashioned concept of a hotel.

At the same time, new hotels seem to be built on or near the outskirts of cities, and, with their arrangements for free parking, are coming closer to the concept of a motel.

No so long ago, too, the small "foreign" automobile was a new fashion. It forced our indigenous automobile industry to meet the serious competition by making what came to be called the "compact" car. But now, this year, we notice the emergence of what is being advertised as "the large compact" car. This may likely lead to some confusion between what is a compact, large automobile and what is a large, compact one.

How are we to comment on these evidences of progress? By a platitudinous remark that "competition is the life of trade" or that "the more things change, the more they are the same"?

Or perhaps we may invent a new saying, based on the preliminary objectives of astronauts: "The farther and faster we travel, the more we come back to where we started from."

ASHEVILLE, N.C.—Bishop John J. Wright of Pittsburgh said e that "history more than heresy" prevents the "easy" reunion the Christian churches.

But, Bishop Wright added, "cultural unity" among the nations the West "may hopefully lead to unity of the Church of Christ."

He made the statement in an address at a three-week Christian humanism seminar sponsored here by Bishop Vincent S. Waters of Raleigh. Representatives of more than 30 catholic colleges attended lectures and took part in discussions during the seminar.

Bishop Wright said Christianity has given the western nations a shared view of man, and it is this humaist tradition which is the basis of the ecumenical movement.

He noted that the threat of communism is a further incentive for the spiritual forces of the West to draw closer in a community dedicated to preserving the true image of man.

He declared Catholics today must be willing to admit human mistakes. Nothing will so disarm the Protestant critics of Catholicism as this humility, he stated.







### British government aids Catholic schools

The government also provided loans at normal bank-rates to cover the remaining expenses of construction and repair. These loans run 15 or 20 years, or longer.

BY FAR THE great majority of Catholics are industrial workers. Many of them are in fact among the lowest-paid manual workers, or "mavies." • Discussing problems: It is impossible for a teacher to have all the visits she would like with parents. There aren't enough hours in the day, So telephone for an appointment. 'Nothing is more disturbing to a well-organized classroom than a parent with a problem standing in the doorway discussing his child, while the class, without any supervision, wastes precious time."

Telephoning: Be brief in your conversations with teach.

Sickness: As a rule keep the child at home for 24 hours after a temperature. "As a teacher, I was shocked when mothers sent their children to school with notes reading: 'Johnny was sick last high. • Helping the child: "Encourage reading—don't let them waste time on comics. Fill their bookshelves with the wonderful books on the market today."

• Homework: Have him complete his homework at a reasonable hour. "Playing out of doors until late, and then trying to finish a sheet of arithmetic problems adds up to one cranky child two cranby narrells."




