

# Chicago tragedy

George Orwell's 1984 arrived 16 years ahead of nedule last week in Chicago. Perhaps it will sense its maturity and slink back into the shadows of the fu-e. We carnestly hope so.

Thanks to television, countless millions of Americans got a long, hard look last week at Big Brother's perfect police state. Chicago style. Surely few could have been anything but horrified—sufficiently horrified, we pray, to resolve that Orwell's fictional 1984 never will come to pass and that the real 1984 will be one where Judeo-Christian concepts of mercy, freedom and justice have reached their finest flower.

We saw all the television coverage of the Chicago tragedy, and we have read everything about it, pro and con, that we could lay hands on Were we to have had only the printed word to rely upon in evaluating the happenings, we should be much less certain than we are in measuring the enormity of the tragedy. But, again thanks to television, we were there. We saw it with our own eyes and heard it with our own ears.

The charges of police and National Guard brutality leveled by the presidents of the National Council of Churches and the Synagogue Council of America cannot be washed away by the apologias of Chicago Mayor Richard J. Daley or Vice-President Hubert H. Humphrey. We repeatedly saw craed brutality against innocents, as did television viewers everywhere.

Other Protestant, Catholic and Jewish clergymen Other Protestant, Catholic and Jewish clergymen were on the embattled streets of Chicago, operating in teams under the direction of the North Side Co-operative Ministry. They weren't out there in any sort of ideological protest confrontation. As the Rev. Herb Davis of St. Paul's United Church of Christ explained, they were there "because the police attacks were so unbelievable we felt we had . . . to give what human and medical aid we could."

One among them was Father Raymond A. Schroth, S.J., a former associate editor of and a frequent contributor to America magazine. A brilliant journalist of long experience, Father Schroth told of watching police pull a boy "very brutally" from a statue and of admiring the efforts of news reporters and photographers record the scene while police moved among them, beating them senseless and smashing cameras.

"One of the best ways to control evil, which in-cludes violence," Father Schroth said, "is to expose it. The threat of exposure is one of the great weapons free seople have."

We say amen to that. Daley has defended his role in the Chicago tragedy as that of a mayor simply concerned with securing the public safety. The exposed record seems to belie this.

Television told us a lot more about Daley. A most vivid example: In a seconding speech for Senator Aboraham I. Ribicoff of Connecticut gestured toward Daley, seated directly in front of him about 15 feet away, and said: "With McGovern as President, we wouldn't have Gestapo tactics in the streets of Chicago."

Daley and one of his fuglemen, a burly Cook County commissioner named George Dunne, reportedly leaped to their feet and, hands cupped to mouths, gleefully taunted Ribicoff with shouts of "You fink!" and "Rat fink!"

A picture is worth 10,000 words, it is said, and television's pictures last week were worth millions of words. But two words—like say, "You fink!" being hysterically bellowed by the mayor of Chicago at a great Jewish American statesman—are worth a lot, too. # Hello, universe

Scientists with international reputations — not science-fiction writers or Joe Pyne guests — are soberly and seriously investigating and talking about some mysterious signals being heard in outer space.

In July, 1967, an English astronomer in a routine survey of electronic waves from space, picked up some faint, regularly-spaced signals which had never been heard before and which could not be identified. Since then other observers and observatories have picked up the signals, or "pulsars," and have been just as confounded.

The conclusion is that the signals just now being heard on earth come from an estimated distance of at least 1,000 trillion miles out in space.

It is not the vast distance of origination that throws astronomers, but the fact that the signals occur with precise regularity.

What bedevils the scientists is whether they might have stumbled onto an intergalactic communications network of some sort, one that is operated by intelligent creatures probing the universe outside their own galaxy.

Here we are on earth, just beginning to stick our finger hesitatingly into space and marvelling at our own audacity in trying to put a man on the moon. The moon, after all, is our next-door neighbor, and any astronomer will confirm that we are only a minor planet revolving around a minor sun.

Now some learned, scholarly citizens tell us they might really be eavesdropping on a communications system impossible to any intelligence save one eons more advanced than ours. It's enough to make a poor earthling feel pretty small.

It is also enough to make us marvel anew at the wonder and the grandeur of the Mind, unbound and unlimited, that conceived the divine plan of the universe.






